What makes a great picture book?

Key Ingredients

These are the ingredients I look for and whilst not every picture book will tick off all of these points you want to choose books that have several covered:

- Does It tell a unique story in its economy of words?
- ✓ Does the story build and is well structured?
- Is there a well-developed character that children will love?
- Does the story help a child make sense of their world or provide new insights into their feelings?
- Is the text playful, fun and memorable?
- Do the text and illustrations work together to tell the story?
- Do the illustrations have storytelling qualities and help to extend the text?
- Does the story have that 'read it again!' quality?
- Does it appeal to a child and the 'child within the adult?





The Lost Thing by Shaun Tan

A boy finds a lost 'thing' on the beach where he's scavenging for his bottle top collection. The thing is a large, freakish creature that no one really notices. A quirky tale about finding your place in the world.


A boy discovers a bizarre-looking creature while out collecting bottle-tops at a beach. Having guessed that it is lost, he tries to find out who owns it or where it belongs, but the problem is met with indifference by everyone else, who barely notices its presence. Each is unhelpful in their own way; strangers, friends, parents are all unwilling to entertain this uninvited interruption to day-to-day life. In spite of his better judgement, the boy feels sorry for this hapless creature, and attempts to find out where it belongs.



Where the Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak

Feeling misunderstood at home and at school, mischievous Max escapes to the land of the Wild Things, majestic -- and sometimes fierce -- creatures. They allow Max to become their leader, and he promises to create a kingdom where everyone will be happy. 


Diary of a Wombat by Jackie French, illustrated by Bruce Whatley






Leaping Lola by Tracey Hawkins, illustrated by Anil Tortop

A thousand things, or maybe more It's up to you to keep the score . . .






My Two Blankets by Irena Kobold, illustrated by freya Blackwood




Heads and Tails Insects by John Canty


There's a Hippopotamus on Our Roof Eating Cake
